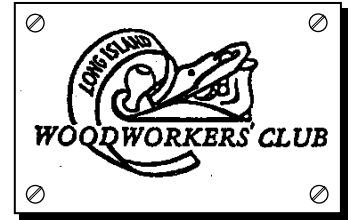

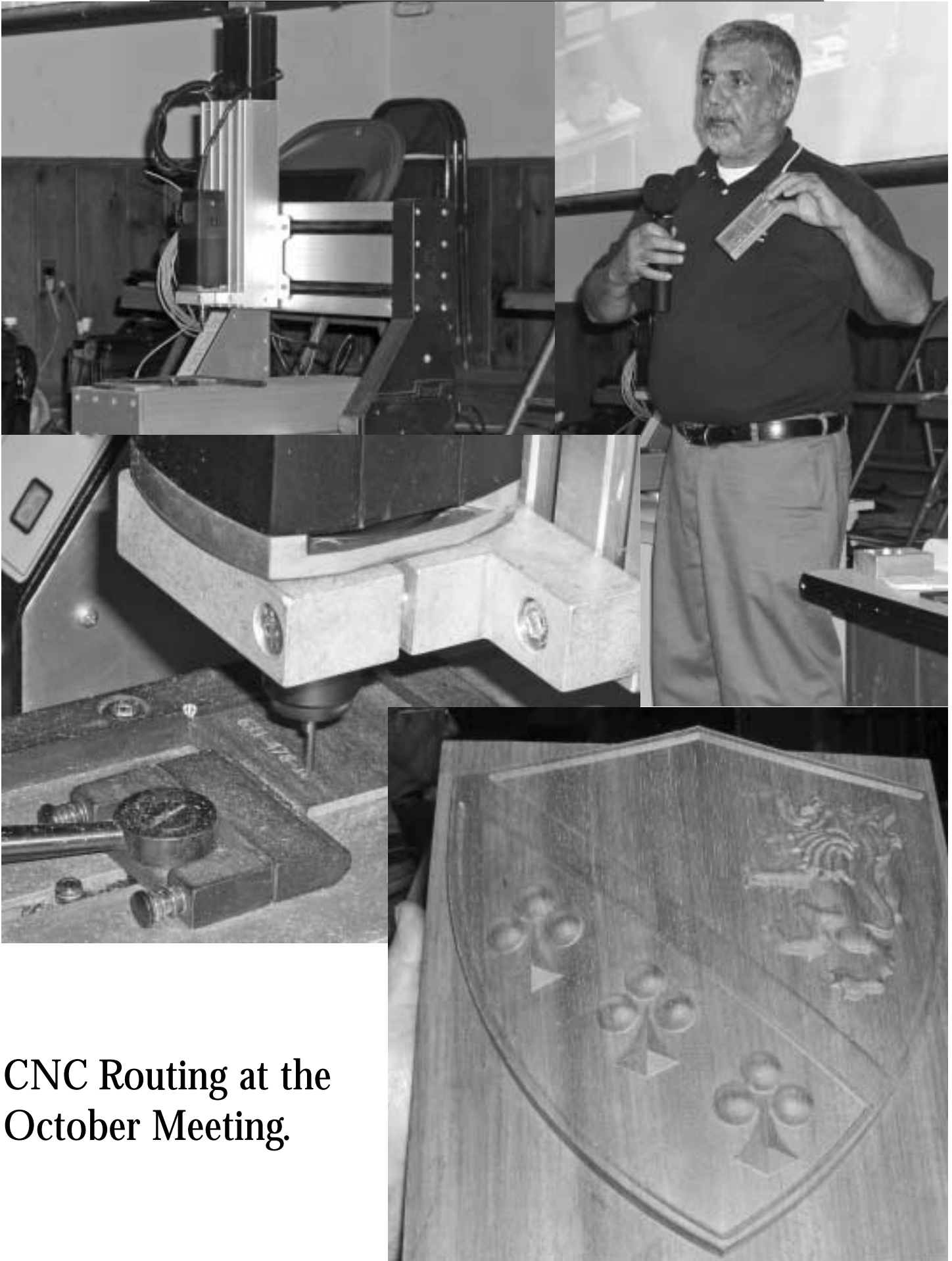

SHOW AND TELL: Pete has been busy as usual: he made a pair of lamps for his mother-in-law, and brought in one to share with us - made of walnut and mahogany. He also made a "steady rest" to help him when he makes any long, slender item, especially those magic wands he does so well. Bob Reimertz made some nice candle holders.

Sorry we missed Ed Kelle at this meeting, but the horrific rains left him with some flood waters to take care of. Hope everything goes well for Ed.

Tonight's project is a pepper mill. We are making a 6" pepper mill, but of course anyone who wishes to make one bigger can do so. Most of us had mahogany available to us for this project, but teak, oak, walnut and sycamore are all suitable. A variety of shapes can be made, but for the beginners, simple profiles without much adornment are preferable. The largest diameter of the finished turning should be the base, or the project will look top-heavy and out of proportion. The pepper mills should be finished by our November meeting.

Novembers meeting will be held on Thursday, November 10 at 7 p.m. At November's meeting we will be making Christmas ornaments. For all of you who have already made some, please bring them in for show and tell. ☺

His portrait was sawn on leather and he described how to work with this unique material. Rolf showed of his Christmas portrait, artfully colorize with backing material from the scrapebook section of the local crafts show. Harry, our portrait expert who taught us all portrait making at our last meeting, showed off his latest self portrait. All three showing expert craftsmanship.
