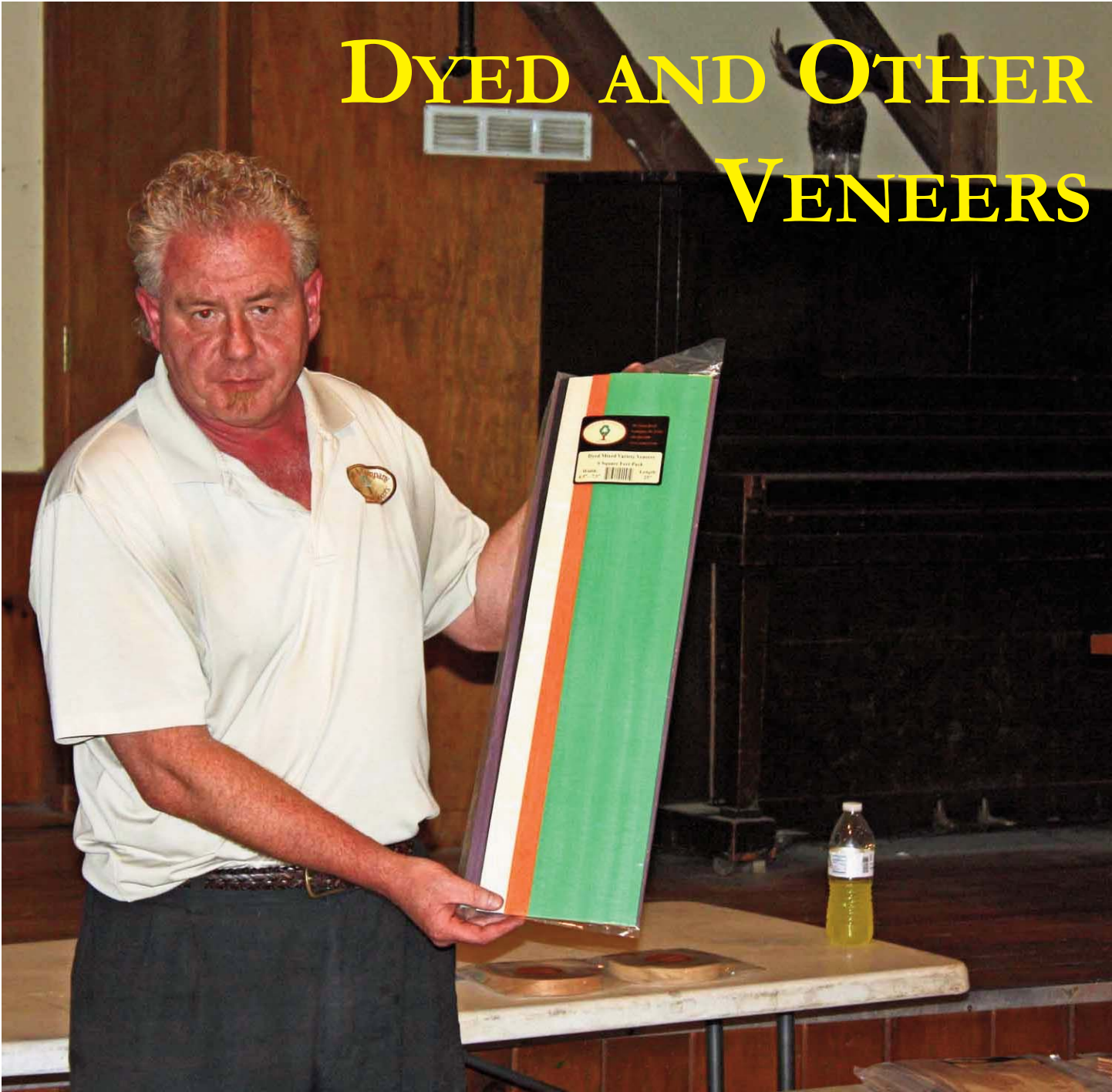

SSOW is working on little crank figures and open carving

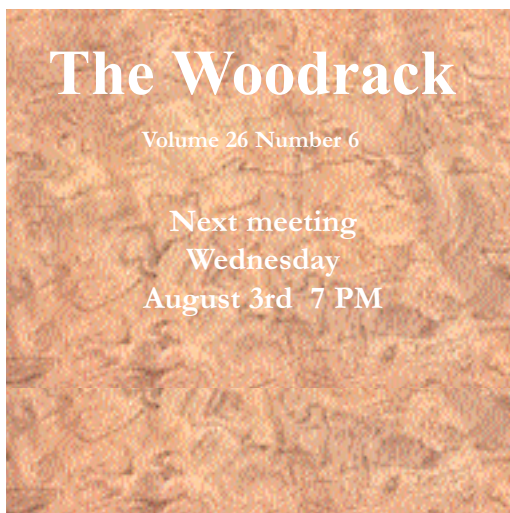
LICFM will have Jim Brown discussing casework and plywood.
