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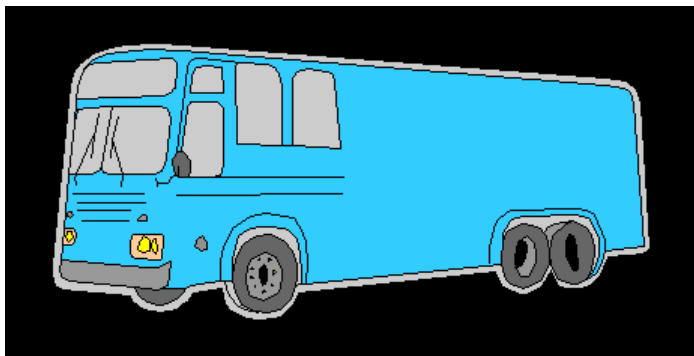
LIWC Sponsors Bus to Northeast Woodworking Show March 24

There will be a bus ride on March 24, 2001, sponsored by the LIWC to Saratoga Springs to attend the Northeast Woodworking Show.

This will be my fourth show, and each one is better than the last. The show is very different from the American Woodworkers Show, inasmuch as there are extensive displays of members' crafts, free seminars, vendors, woodworking demon-

strations, and a large jig exhibit. The most interesting vendors at this show are the ones from the hardwood mills. Well-known craftsmen will be there also to demonstrate and lecture.

We plan to leave early Saturday morning and to



return late that evening. The show will be open between 11 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. The bus will have facilities and VCR's for continuous Norm Abram videos.

Seating will be limited to 50, so if you want to go, get your money in. We believe the cost will be between \$30-35 per person, and again, spouses are welcome. A \$20 deposit will be required to secure your seat. This will be
