Our guest speakers for the evening were Ben Nawrath and Norman Bald.

The topic for the evening was "Band Saw Setup". Ben and Norman stressed the importance of having the Tool manual. Most tool manuals are available, free and online through the manufacturer. The machine should be cleaned before and after using to insure efficiency. Clean off belts, wheels, and guides etc. using a compressor to clean out all sawdust around and inside parts of the saw. Prior to using the machine, check all belts to insure they are tight and turning correctly. Inspect the blade to insure it is running true. Ben suggested the use Link Belts instead of the V-Belts. For running the pulleys.

Setting up and maintaining the saw is instrumental for insuring safe and accurate usage.

A special thanks to Ben and Norman for taking the time to demonstrate the many facets of tool setup, safety and usage.

he September turners meeting started at 7 PM led by President Steve Fulgoni

Tonights demo was on Spoon with a twisted handle.

The spoons are created using two pieces of wood The handle and the spoon itself. For the spoon it was suggested to use very dry Birch. Turn it between centers in an egg shape. On the fatter side of the spoon shape turn a 1/4" tenon. (A 1/4" open end wrench can be ground down on a grinder to be a gauge and cutting tool to get a perfect tenon everytime.

Glue small wedges with hot glue to the spoon and then glue everything to a flat thin hardboard base. USe this setup to safely cut the spoon curved shape on the band saw.

Make sure the spoon is supported on all sides!

The handle is made from a compressed wood called "Comp. Wood" its sold by <u>puretimber.com</u> This wood comes in all varieties and is compressed from all sides by extreme weights.

With this material you turn the first 1/2" by the head stock round. Leave the rest. Take the piece back to the band saw and cut a long "V" shape into the handle right up to the rounded section.

Sand the forks of the taper smooth, round off the edges.

Soak the handle overnight in plain water. The next morning twist the two fork prongs to the desired shape. And let dry.

On the spoon half, scoop out the spoon with a rotary tool, hand tool, files whatever you have. Sand smooth.

Once dry epoxy the handle into the spoon.

You can use different colored dyes on the handle to get different effects and to give the spoon a worn appearance, lightly sand the edges to go through parts of the dye.

Joe P (Sawdust Joe) gave a short presentation on Scrollsaw boxes.

Bob Carpentier discussed his experience and the process involved in making a "book".

Using a limb from a neighbor's tree. Steps included:

Using a large bandsaw to make the pages, i.e. using longitudinal cuts.

Scrollsawing each page to tell the story.

Embellishing each page with wood carving, in this case using a Dremel.

"Binding" the log book with leather strips.

SEPTEMBER MEETING:

Bob Carpentier shared his experiences with the ancient art of Insarsia.

Wikepedia describes Intarsia as "a woodworking technique that uses varied shapes, sizes, and species of wood fitted together to create ... a picture. Intarsia is created through the selection of different types of wood, using their natural grain pattern and color ... to create variations in the pattern. After selecting the specific woods to be used within the pattern, each piece is then individually cut, shaped, and finished. Once the individual pieces are complete, they are fitted together like a jig-saw puzzle and glued to wood backing."

Bob discussed his use of patterns, wood selection, cutting (scroll sawing) the individual pieces, shaping, gluing and finishing. He brought in a number of his intarsia projects – EXCELLENT work.

<u>October Meeting</u>: "Picture Frames". Alain Tiercy, one of our most accomplished and long-time scrollers, will discuss making your own frames. Framing your project really completes it as a work of art. Why buy a frame when you can make your own!

re started off the meeting with some general reminders; The show is coming up! Nov 7-8, drop off projects the 6th. Roger will run our booth this year with Ben helping. See either one of us to help out. We like to have people rotate in and out working on things to show people. Norm will have his sample joints. Bob can help transport large projects if need be.

For show and tell Roger brought a router mortising jig from fine WW. He also brought his centipede saw horse that he got to help his son work on his house. It folds up very compact and can be configured to a wide range of sizes.

Tyrone made a dowel hinge lid box from Rob Cosman plans.

Rich Macrae did the main presentation on inlay, highlighting string inlay and wider banding.

For string inlay, it's typically 1/32" wide. He uses a shooting board style jig and a wheel style cutter to cut strips. He draws the piece thru a cutting jig, basically two cutting edges mounted facing each other on a block in a vise, to make it thinner. Try to have the final piece barely proud of face of panel. The more you have to sand or scrape the more likely you are to damage any surrounding veneer.

Inlaybanding.com is a good source of materials.

For the mating mortise, use scratch stock cutter or very small router bit, typically in a Dremel with a special plunge base. Use square as a straight reference guide and a scalpel to clean out corners or make them nice and square.

Some good general rules to follow are to miter corners on wider banding to maintain pattern flow. And use thicker material for larger shapes or bands to make it easier to work with.
