








NOT MY MOST FAVORITE TOOL, BUT...

...one that I use a lot is my stationary wire wheel. Mounted on a grinder pedestal along with a grind stone (see photo), I use this for cleaning up rusty tools and screws that I have bought, inherited or just neglected too long. Why just today, I used it to clean the now rusty and sappy screws used to secure my Christmas tree in its stand.

I have worn out at least one wheel and replaced it. I learned that the "coarse "one is, well, just too coarse, so mine is the "fine" variety. It does a great job and gets most of the rust although I have to occasionally use my Dremel with wire wheel in tight corners.

The grind stone is handy too. Great for grinding the heads off rivets or rusty bolts because I am loathe to use my "good" sharpening grinder for such menial tasks.

The grinder/wire wheel combo is powered by an (very) old refrigerator motor I harvested from my local landfill when the staff there didn't get upset when you left with more than you brought. Ah, but times have changed. L

Back to the wire wheel. It has the charming ability to dislodge small screws you may choose to hold by hand and propel them to the dark dusty corners of your shop while *polishing* the skin on your fingertips. DAMHIKT (which is internet speak for "don't ask me how I know this"). Still, while not my favorite, it is a very important tool in my shop.

Show & Tell -

Bob Urso had a Walnut Platter finished with Libron Oil & Wax.

Charlie Cumming had a Red Oak Bowl finished with salad bowl finish and a box from Black Walnut with a Basswood Celtic Knot inlay.

Barry Saltsberg made a Cherry Hollow Form which he then carved and pierced with an air powered tool using a carbide burr.

Charlie Felsen mad a Birdhouse Ornament from pallet wood and used Deft Lacquer to finish it.

Mark Richman made a Marblewood Vase finished with Salad Bowl Finish.

Tonight's presenter is Barry Saltsberg and the topic is Hollowing.

Some form of hollowing is done on most turned pieces, for example a bowl has the center removed, a goblet is hollowed within the cup portion and a Vase or Hollow Form is hollowed by removing the inside material.

Just as there are different forms of Hollowing, there are different tools that can be used to facilitate removing the wood. For a bowl, one would use a bowl gouge, for a goblet or hollow form you would use a hollowing tool. However, for hollowing a deep hollow form it is best to use a hollowing system that uses a laser to help determine the wall thickness. This is necessary because it is impossible to see, or feel, the interior of the piece to determine how thick the wall is. Calipers are also a necessary tool when doing any type of hollowing.

Thank you Barry for a very informative demo.

The next meeting will be on Thursday, February 9th. Topic has not yet been determined.
