

LIW President Mike Daum called the September 6th General Meeting to order at 7:08 PM. The session was inperson at the barn and live-streamed via Zoom.

Mike opened the meeting by announcing that he and Ed Piotrowski had toured the Knights of Columbus Hall at 44 Church Street in Kings Park. They believe the site is suitable for LIW meetings during the November through January period when the Brush Barn will be unavailable due to the SHS Winter Festival activities [*Update: a contract has been signed with the K of C*].

Mike appointed Ed Dillon and Charlie Felsen to serve on the Nominating Committee for the upcoming LIW Board Member election.

Mike and Show Chair Bob Lerner discussed the progress-to-date of the Annual Show preparations. Last moment, issues and assignments were discussed. Bob emphasized some important show-related dates and times: Set-up on 9/8, 9:30 AM - 5:30 PM; out on 9/10 by 5:00 PM.

Presentation Titebond Glues

Bob Behnke, Technical Services Manager, Construction Products Division of Franklin International, makers of the Titebond Glue product line, provided members with a highly informative discussion regarding adhesives. The detailed presentation was accompanied by a slide show which highlighted essential points. The slide deck is available in the "Members" section of the LIW website.

One item mentioned by Bob that was new information for me was to use the least pressure needed to hold the wood in the required position. Greater clamping force produces weaker joins since much of the adhesive is squeezed out. Another gem was Bob's statement that Titebond II is best for metal-to-wood glue-ups.

The entire discussion was detailed and information-packed. Reviewing the slide deck is highly recommended. Many thanks to Bob Behnke for sharing his expert insights comprehensively and professionally.

The meeting adjourned at 9:00 PM.





MONTHLY TIP

CHARLIE JAMES

I take my chisels or plane irons to the stones on occasion but not nearly as much as before I made these strops some years ago. I used yellow glue and glued some leather to a few pieces of Oak flooring, this happens to be my old weight lifting belt. Any sturdy leather will do, the polishing compound is just rubbed on. Clamp it well, you want a flat surface

The September 12th cabinet and furniture makers meeting was held at Harry's Urban Hardwoods. The discussion mainly revolved around the show and the exhibits. There was a suggestion about judging items that were not to be considered. At the Saratoga Show, the public votes on items regardless of whether they will be judged. Another suggestion was to have more prominent "Do not touch signs" and that the members should not touch their items or others. As far as judging, one key was the finishing. It was recommended that matte finishes are better than gloss finishes since they show fewer imperfections. Attention to detail is key to getting a ribbon at the show. Daryl Rosenblatt mentioned Capotosto 's four chairs modeled from playing cards that were eye candy from one of the earlier shows; that would not work today. Discussion also came about for more categories as the exhibits have gotten better. Harry Slutter suggested a highly visible bulletin board for the show to explain the different categories, such as furniture with pictures, et cetera.

Most of the meeting was a sampling, mostly pictures, of the exhibits, for example, a steel-legged table and a free-form slab coffee table with a polyurethane finish. Also pictured were a guitar pick chair, a delicate end table, a coffee table, walnut and maple cell phone, and card holders. Also shown were some bridal joints. Other items included a fly-fishing rod holder that used lap joints and was finished in oil.

Daryl Rosenblatt mentioned his Claro Walnut coffee table with inlay entry. Daryl usually uses curves in his construction, but this was more angular. The finish was four coats of Sutherland Welles sealer and 14 coats of Murdoch's Hard Oil, since the wood had a 4 1/2 percent moisture content and soaked up the oil easily. A hickory chair was made with steam-bent parts. The seats were checkered purple and black. A table with drawers made of sycamore was another display, as well as a curved chaise lounge. Joe Mayday showed an 1800 mahogany table with hinged aprons. Joe used Holly and Sapele stringing. One exciting detail was white oak shell inlays. The inlay was made of eight to nine pieces and painstakingly shaded in hot sand, each one individually. The detail provided a three-dimensional aspect.

Barry Saltsberg made a dining room set. The set took a couple of years to complete. It is an Art and Glow design. None of the chairs match, and each chair has individual carvings.

A lopsided chair was another exhibit that prompted discussion. Bill Leonhardt made the chair from two-by-fours. He got the idea from a museum in Denmark. Bill's chair was brought to our meeting. The angles of the chairs are 9 1/2

degrees. Bill tried various joinery techniques such as dowels, threaded rods with epoxy, and mortise and tenon joints to make it sturdy. Most had their weaknesses. Suggestions were made to use harder woods, such as ash, to improve and make the construction easier. Don Daley thought maybe Beech would work and use double bridle joints. Harry Slutter suggested using #8 dominoes. To attach the seat to the chair, Bill made a kerf on the side of the chair and the chair seat and inserted flat steel into the kerfs.

Harry Slutter and Scott McCoy collaborated to make a queen-sized bed for a beach house. The bed was Beechwood, which was bleached. The bed included storage drawers and an opening in the stretcher so that an ironing board could be put there. There is a cap on the headboard, and the bed is finished with polyurethane.

We have been invited to display our work at the Mineola Library. Further details will be announced when they become available.


Since the Barn is unavailable this Nov., Dec., and Jan., our meeting will be held at the K of C Hall, 4 Church St., Kings Park.



The video's focus is on Mr. Balolia's build of four "Forever Boxes" for his grandchildren. The video takes viewers from the idea and first sketch in pencil on a tired piece of paper through the several construction steps to the ultimate realization of a vision. The fun part is that Mr. Balolia shows off his woodworking skills and his stunning home workshop. Let me put it another way.
