

We have to move the gift shop because the COA gift shop will be open this year. The new location will depend on vendor attendance.

As you all know, Joe Botts won't be doing the plane demo this year. In addition, Daryl Rosenblatt will not be available. Mike Luciano has volunteered to assist with a plane demo table, but he will need help for both days. Please see me if you can help. We need to define what the demo will look like.

### TURNER'S GUILD/LICFM

The August 10th meeting was called to order by the President Jim Maloney at 7:15 PM.

**ANNOUNCEMENTS** Lancaster Woodturning Symposium 2023 is Sept. 22 – 24.

Jim passed around a signup sheet for the turning demo volunteers at the show.

**SHOW AND TELL** Tony Fuoco – Showed a vase made from red birch, which was textured.

Jim Maloney – Displayed a segmented vase.

Upcoming Demos TBD - Steve Fulgoni on sharpening lathe chisels.

**RAFFLE** Brian Roughley – lathe chisel.

**DEMO** Jim Maloney – Birds Mouth Bowl.

Jim started with a holly log with bark on it. The length should be longer than the diameter. Using a Forstner bit, he created a flat area on opposite sides through the bark. Then, the piece was mounted between centers. The piece was made round using a bowl gouge and working from the center to the ends. He made sure to leave a lip with bark at the headstock end. A tenon was created at the tailstock end. The bowl was then mounted in a chuck. Jim used increasing diameter Forstner bits to make the hollowing process easier. He then completed the hollowing with an appropriate chisel. The next steps were sanding and applying a finish. The last step was to turn the tenon off.

Jim, thank you for an excellent demonstration. It has encouraged members to give this project a try (Rolf).

BOB WOOD

The cabinet and furniture makers meeting for August 8th began with Rob DeMarco bringing to our attention the Catskill Mountain Maker Camp, which is an excellent opportunity to meet like-minded craftspeople while offering a unique platform to learn new skills and share skills of your own. The Maker Camp is a hands-on Makers gathering that revolves heavily around classes and demonstrations in crafts like blacksmithing, timber framing, welding, woodworking, CNC, epoxy, and much more. This three-day event is held every Columbus Day Weekend at the Blackthorne Resort in East Du<sup>r</sup>ham, NY1.

**SHOW AND TELL** was a Moxon vise made by Bob Nyman, which will be displayed at the show scheduled for September 9th and 10th.

THE TOPIC OF THE EVENING WAS FINISHING. Ben Nawrath started by displaying a piece of walnut he had sprayed twelve times, with no drying in between. Ben went back and forth with a rattle can and then sanded the work with 220 grit. Ben mentioned that you should fill the pores. One can use either Timbermate or glue with dust, but Ben didn't do that. As an aside, Ben has filled knotholes with colored CA glue. Another suggestion is to fill the knots with dried coffee grinds. When using CA glue, it was recommended to spray the accelerant on first and then use the CA glue. An additional hint was to use Total Boat Thixo for filling pores. Also, apply Elmer's white glue. Sand and the slurry will go into the pores matching the sanded wood.

To check the finish, use a light at a raking angle to check for imperfections. Ben uses five-inch pads on his orbital Sander. He bought these on Amazon. Ben then uses a white Scotch Brite pad, which is equivalent to 0000 steel wool. The pads Ben bought do not leave any residue on the orbital sander, and they have a rubber grip.





Another tip for finishing is to use Thick Sticks made by Mohawk; they fill holes and pores.

After Ben sanded with the white Scotch Brite, he then used a wax - Liberon clear. It is a paste wax. After five minutes, Ben wiped with a shop towel and then sanded again. Ben essentially waxed and buffed the piece. Rob DeMarco uses brown paper bags to remove the nubs.

### THE WOODRACK

Ed Piotrowski uses Yorkshire grit. It is left on for twenty minutes and then reapplied. Ed also uses Deft sanding sealer.

Rob DeMarco uses an oil-based finish called Simple Finish, which is put on with a cloth. Leave twenty minutes between two coats. It is not durable, but Rob likes it.

Another side note was to use maroon Scotch Brite pads which are equivalent to double O steel wool. The maroon pad is used to clean off rust on a table saw. One can use Glide Coat or similar products for the table saw top.

Rich Riedel uses Tung Oil. Rich finished an old rocking chair that had gotten wet by accident. It was no problem using the Tung Oil. Rich also employs Tung Oil for Apple Tree wood candle stick holders. Another suggestion was to use wipe-on poly and, between coats, sand with 400 grit.

A brief discussion was also made about polyurethane satin versus gloss. Satin has additives to cut the gloss. A suggestion was to use gloss and sand or Scotch Brite to knock down the gloss. Rob DeMarco suggested putting on gloss coats and then topcoat that with a satin application.

Bringing the item out into the sun is recommended if one is trying to match paints. One will see the actual color.

Water-based lacquer was also brought up, which one can recoat in one hour.

One last comment was regarding polyurethane. If polyurethane is damaged, you must remove all of it from the piece. Whereas with shellac, one only has to fix where the damage is located.



### TRAVELS WITH CHARLIE

### Little pins stabilize floating panels

Woodworkers use a variety of methods to keep floating, solid-wood panels from shifting or rattling in their frames, whether in a door, bed frame, cabinet side, or wherever. This method is the easiest and most secure I've found. Working from the back of the assembly, I drill small holes through the top and bottom edges of the frame, continuing through the edges of the panel without poking through the front of the frame. Then I glue small dowels into the holes. The dowels only show on the backs of the frames, but I make them out of the same wood as the frame when possible, so they blend in. The small pins keep the panels from rattling, sagging downward, or shifting sideways, while allowing them to expand and contract sideways (across the grain).
