

#### **Presentation** Brian Monks – Furniture Carving

Brian offered a very approachable introduction to the fundamentals of furniture carving by focusing on the Ball & Claw and Fan designs. There was much discussion regarding chisel selection. Of course, the topic of sharpening ensued. Brian mentioned that sharpening tools for carving were more honing than grinding.

Brian emphasized the importance of reading the grain and indicated that cross-grain cuts were more demanding than those with the grain. Title: Science made easy. OK, not really easy, but it's really good.

Description: This isn't an April Fools column, for that you have to go back to last April (one of my favorite Chinese cooking channels) but this is also not woodworking. It IS gadgets though, and we all love gadgets. If you aren't, you are likely in the wrong club. This video finally explained to me how sewing machines work, and it's the kind of thinking that can apply to our own jigs, if we ever want to make them to the score of 35MFs on the jig complexity scale (the MF scale is the officially designated jig complexity score named in honor of the craziest jig designer in human history, Michael Fortune. He holds the world record with his double handed two piece shaped and handed armrest flattening jigs with a score of 37). You don't have to design and build jigs just as you don't have to build your own sewing machine. Never fear, for the price of two mortgages you can get any Woodpecker jig you want; if you have a sewing machine, you can then sew the receipt on your shirt as a reminder it's generally cheaper to build your own.

**Description:** In the first video, the presenter walks viewers through the several steps he employed to build a jig that produces star knobs, a "gotta have" item for many woodworking projects. Frankly, the build is relatively complex and requires several precision measurements. The final product is a useful, mostly wooden star knob. At one point in the video (13:36), I thought there was an excellent chance to see a gruesome accident while the presenter/demonstrator used a table-mounted router to round over the star knob's arms. While holding the star knob, his fingers were fractions of an inch from the router bit. Another viewer commented on the spectacularly unsafe practice.

The second video is a revelation since it perfects the jig's design and incorporates building a safe partsholder to correct the unsafe practice shown in the previous video. Almost 9 minutes of this video are dedicated to constructing the parts holder. Well done, Wood Products.

Another observation: The design and building of this jig, not to mention the parts holder side project, must have taken many hours across several days. A quick look on Amazon finds star knobs that are arguably better than the shop-made varieties ranging from \$0.60 to less than \$2 each. And delivered to your door in one day... What is the value proposition offered by this project?
