Discussion – Some Jigs

Buddy Savoie started the discussion by showing various router jigs he uses for cabinet-making. These included a "Poor Man's" surfacing jig, a Collins Plywood Prep Bit, and an Amana 1/16" Radius Bit. Mike Daum showed a tapered sliding dovetail jig, a planer and joiner blade sharpening jig, and a slanted box joint jig.

Both presenters explained how their jigs improved the efficiency and accuracy of the associated tasks. The design of these labor savers was ingenious in its simplicity and effectiveness. Thank you for sharing your knowledge.

LICFM

The September 10th Cabinet and Furniture Makers meeting was dedicated to a review of some of the show items. It was a random selection as we scrolled through the photos. The selections are briefly described and demonstrate the club members' variety of work. It is unintentional that the names of some projects are cited, but others are not. No offense is meant to anybody. Below is a listing of some of the pieces.

Corey Tighe's guitar pick stool is made from sapele.

Second-place entry was a table with a burled wood top.

Table with iron legs that may have come from a sewing machine.

Oak table with wedged tenons and tiger maple top.

Coffee table with epoxy-filled top and wedged legs. Wedges are 90 degrees to the grain to prevent splitting.

Charlie Morehouse built a side table; I hope I'm correct, Charlie, with carved ball and claw legs.

Leo Meliak built a Rubio workbench using European Beech for the top and Southern Yellow Pine for the rest. The bench can be disassembled using wedged tenons.

Table with creative flowery knobs.

Ben Nawrath showed his greenwood stool.

CD rack made of cherry.

Joe Pascucci made a step stool utilizing piano hinges to make it collapsible. Plans are available online.

- Jean Piotrowski displayed a stereo cabinet with an excellent choice of wood—walnut and spalted maple with appealing grain patterns. The legs were shaped like large handles.
- Joe Maday saw a photo of a Bombay Chest at Sotheby's twelve years ago and reproduced it. The center of the top is a matched burl; the banding is ash. Quarter-sawn elm was also used in the construction. The top of the chest was dovetailed and delicate. Joe was told the top may have been separate, but he could find no evidence. Joe also said he had to bend the brass fixtures to fit the curves of the chest. The brass is cast, which I believe is from White Castle or Optimum Brass. The cabriolet legs were reinforced with blocks with no mechanical joinery. The finish was shellac.

A floating tabletop was in the right light to show brush strokes.

Another table had a marble top with the legs splayed inward

A table with marquetry.

Rob DeMarco made a surfboard-shaped slab table out of walnut. Rob finished it with Sutherland Welles. Rob was offered one thousand dollars for the item.

A beautiful violin restoration was exhibited.

A jewelry box made to look like a backpack. It was all wood, including the straps.

Frank Napoli carved a gracious-looking horse.

Barry Saltsberg turned a plate – blue in the middle with a scalloped carved wooden surround.

Pat Lerner scrolled a hummingbird from Baltic birch and sapele. As is the case, Pat painted the bird with acrylic, which showed iridescence on the throat.

Dennis Taddeo made a veneered box.

- Rolf Beuttenmuller scrolled an owl from lignum vitae. Rolf used the wood grain to make the feathers look real. The frame also enhanced the presentation.
- A twenty-year-old canoe was also shown.
- Jim Moloney turned a segmented wood vase with a band. Four woods were incorporated white oak, yellow heart, walnut, and maple.

A cannon was another segmented turning. The barrel looked real. The base and wheels are also all wood.

Joe Nyman made a tool cabinet from salvaged mahogany. Joe glued strips together to make the panels.

As mentioned previously, there were many other entries worthy of mention, but hopefully, the sampling provides a good representation of the club's skills and experience.

Additional comments concerned the judging, placement of projects, and listing of awards in a prominent space. The turnout of visitors was better than last year, which could have been due to a Newsday article the previous Thursday.

LOCK, STOCK & DARYL

Description: I've tried various forms of panel clamps and have yet to find a better solution than making things flat and square and clamping them up with cauls. Many others prefer the panel clamp method. (I saw the dream version in Harry's Urban Hardwoods shop, the wall-mounted super monster—out of price range and space for most of us, so I'm ignoring it so this video can have meaning.)

The presentation is fake and hokey, but he makes some points about using unistruts for panel clamps. It's an interesting starting point for this type of assembly. If we had a meeting just on panel clamps, we would probably have 20 solutions from 18 members; so here is no. 21, and let's start the discussion.

Description: At some point, I suppose most woodworkers try their hands at bending wood. Obtaining the materials needed for the steam box, selecting an appropriate wood species for bending, having an adequate clamping system in place, and getting the inevitable burn from escaping steam or handling super hot stock fresh out of the steamer. And lest I forget, building a mold. This video provides an overview of most of the steps involved but essentially skips mold details.

My first venture was a DIY plywood steam box built following plans obtained from Rockler along with the steam generator. The project was a success, and bent wood projects were followed shortly thereafter. Some lessons learned included using gloves while handling material fresh from the steam box; trying some test pieces before bending the project lumber is essential; water will inevitably spill on the floor; and the bending paraphernalia (steam box, generator, and mold) are a pain to store when not in use.

I recommend this video because of its practical advice and approachability. Moreover, using readily available PVC pipe for the steam box results in a mechanism clearly superior to plywood, though it is more expensive. Several "how-to" construction videos are available.

Title: Fast Cherry Bowl / 11:17 with a full minute of glamor shots at the end

Description: At first, I thought this looked like a neat way to embellish a bowl, much like the old curvy stripe through a cutting board. But he starts the video showing a rough turned blank that's been sitting around for years and had turned obround, almost football-shaped. That's when the lightbulb came on. By cutting it up the middle and adding some flat boards, he's essentially making the blank round again. I happen to have a small mulberry blank that is a reasonable facsimile of an avocado I'd like to try this on! There are a few little details along the way, and he makes use of the biggest disc sander I've ever seen to flatten things, but overall, it's super simple and a great way to salvage a blank that may not otherwise be usable. Please enjoy.

TRAVELS WITH CHARLIE

When inserting brass sleeves into pen blanks, sometimes the glue gets into the brass. The dried glue can make it nearly impossible to thread the sleeve onto the mandrel without drilling or reaming it. I've read a few tips. One is pushing the brass into a potato to block it, and the one I have been using is pushing the brass into Play-Doh.
